

DIRECTOR'S NOTE

judge. A police officer. A General. A teacher. A soldier. A doctor. A pillar of the religious community. All figures of moral authority. Such respectable English people don't commit murder, right? Their actions are justified, even virtuous. Crimes are what *other* people do. Death happens to *other* people. As we find ourselves trapped together on Soldier Island, we are compelled to reflect on the ambiguous nature of quilt and justice.

And Then There Were None is Agatha Christie's darkest and most influential novel. One of the most famous crime stories ever written, it is considered to be Christie's magnum opus, and it is the world's best selling mystery of all time. Perhaps because it is not a traditional Christie whodunit, rather, it stands out as a true psychological thriller. Most chillingly though, is Christie's pulsing reminder throughout: that anyone has the potential to be a killer. All that is required is the right motive.

Set in 1939 off the coast of Devon, England, Agatha Christie's And Then There Were None is a witness to its time and place, weaving themes of colonialism, imperialism, classism, racism, and misogyny casually throughout the work. Yet here, she does not fall into the trope of the "base foreigner" as a guilty party. She has turned that on its head, condemning the "native" English to that role, and exposing the cozy hypocrisy of her characters. As such, one might argue that Christie was challenging the foundations of British society, perhaps even indicting the myth of British moral superiority on which colonialism is based. Perhaps this is too generous an interpretation, but regardless of Christie's intention when contemplating "the other" (otherness) in her novels, these questions inspired me to absorb And Then There Were None through a retrospective lens.

Much like the members of our Workshop, Agatha Christie did not shy away from the input of others. Not only is this thrilling mystery great fun for Workshop actors to perform, the history of this novel and Christie's writings as a whole are a fascinating example of a creative artist, their estate, or their adapters altering their work over time for TV, film, and the stage, for better or for worse. In regards to the play at hand, previous titles included racist terminology that were changed due to their offensive nature. Insensitive language sprinkled throughout earlier versions of the novel and play were mostly scrubbed. The ending was altered, ministering to a society deeply wounded by the horrors of WWII. These iterations remain a part of Christie's career and canon. Originally written in 1939, the novel had a much more disturbing ending than what Christie eventually wrote for the stage play version in 1943. Christie "took into account what was perceived to be the needs of audiences during a very dark time in history," according to her grandson Mathew Prichard. Post war audiences yearned to escape to a world where things worked out neatly. And so, we have two endings to consider. Which ending have we opted for? Could it be ... both? You'll find out soon enough.

An example of what we do on Monday nights at Theatre Artists Workshop is about to play out before you in our typical staged reading style: scripts in hand, a few chairs, benches, rehearsal blocks, a music stand here or there...not too many bells and whistles [well ... I had to put in a few!]. What I mean to say is ... It's about the work. I hope you enjoy.

AGATHA CHRISTIE (Playwright) Born in Torquay, England in 1890, Agatha Christie is the best-selling novelist of all time. With over one billion books sold in English and another billion in over 100 languages, she is outsold only by the Bible and Shakespeare. She wrote 80 crime novels and collections of short stories, over 25 plays (including *The Mousetrap*, the world's longest running play), and six novels under the pseudonym Mary Westmacott. Her first novel, *The Mysterious Affair at Styles*, introduced the world to the Belgian detective Hercule Poirot, followed a decade later by the shrewd and often-underestimated Miss Marple.

ANDREA LYNN GREEN (Director) Andrea has produced and co-directed several Theatre Artists Workshop benefits, including *Bushwacked! And Other Short Plays* by Rosemary Foley (2023, in partnership with Greenwich Theatre Company), and three playwrights festivals. Andrea is co-artistic

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director of the burgeoning Greenwich Theatre Company, where she directed *A Christmas Memory* (digital production) which was named one of the best professional Connecticut productions in 2021 by the late Connecticut Critics Circle member Jim Ruocco. Andrea has directed several readings including her play *Welcome Home* at Primary Stages. Notable acting credits include Broadway: *Who's Afraid of Virginia Woolf?* directed by Joe Mantello, as well as several top regional theatres and T.V. and film productions.

KRISTEN KINGSLEY* (Stage Manager) is a Connecticut based Stage Manager. She's been involved in many aspects of theatre for the last 25+ years and has been trained by several mentors along the way.
